This Sunday is Miha Sunday, and Pa Pripi will lead us in our celebration.

Fr Simi's Reflection: "For this is the will of my Father, that everyone who sees the Son and believes in him may have eternal life, and I shall raise him on the last day."
(John 6:40)

While we remember the dead at every Mass, the month of November is dedicated to them as a special month of remembrance. It is fitting that as we approach the end of another liturgical year of uniting ourselves to Christ's birth, life, suffering, death and resurrection and ascension into heaven, that we bring to the altar our prayers for the souls of all whose earthly lives have ended.

When we remember them, we do not remember them apart from our remembering Christ's own death and resurrection, for apart from Him, life and death will be gravely misunderstood and become unbearable. We remember that by His conception in the womb of His blessed Mother Mary, all wombs of all women have been blessed and all the children that were ever conceived in their mothers are blessed in Him. We remember that by His birth, Christ has blessed the lives of every child born on this earth and the lives of every parent. No child is born outside the embrace of the Son of God and Son of Mary.

We remember that by His baptism, washing of the stain of sin and sanctification of souls are made available to all who seek salvation and reconciliation with God, their Creator.

We remember that by His suffering and death, Christ has offered His whole being to God the Father as a pleasing sacrifice of infinite love that we who believe in Him may, in our own suffering and death, be an eternal offering of love to God the Father.

We remember that by His burial, He has hallowed the grave of all souls who believe in Him and that as their mortal bodies return to dust, they await the resurrection on the last day: the day of His Second Coming.

Not one soul will escape His judgment at the end of their lives, nor at the end of time. Yet with confidence, we pray for all souls in November because we are commending them and uniting them to the Merciful Judge, who did not come to the world to condemn us but to save us.

No soul exists and dies outside of Him who created them, was born for them, lived for them, suffered and died for them and rose from the dead for them. Death is not the end. He, the Risen One, is our End.

Catholic Social Teaching/Pope's Quote: The New Testament not only tell us of the earthly Jesus and his tangible and loving relationship with the world. It also shows him risen and glorious, present throughout creation by his universal Lordship. "For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, making peace by the blood of his cross" (Col 1:19-20). This leads us to direct our gaze to the end of time, when the Son will deliver all things to the Father so that " God may be everything to everyone" The very flowers of the field and the birds which his human eyes contemplated and admired are now imbued with his radiant presence.'

Action: Spend time admiring and appreciating nature, God's precious gift to us, and know you are admiring God the Father and his only Son's presence here on earth.
